

Off-Campus Sites and Regional Colleges

Students who live outside of Saskatoon can begin their studies in the College of Arts and Science, College of Agriculture and Bioresources and the College of Education at one of the off-campus sites or Regional College partners. Some degree programs can even be completed at these off-campus sites.

If your student would like to begin their U of S degree program at an off-campus site, the application process is the same as for students applying to the main campus in Saskatoon. There is a question on the admission application asking if the student would like to study at an off-campus location. Students can indicate on the application which off-campus site they prefer.

Arts and Science Transition Program

This popular initiative has been designed for students under the age of 21 whose high school grades fall below the minimum admission average for the College of Arts and Science. The Transition Program provides a supportive and close-knit learning environment that can help students make the transition from high school to university.


In the Arts and Science Transition Program, students can complete 18 credit units (9 credit units, or three classes, per term) in a Transition Program Learning Community or at an off-campus site or Regional College. After successfully completing 18 credit units, students can remain in the College of Arts and Science to work toward a degree or they can apply to transfer to another college or program upon meeting the transfer requirements.
